Calling 911: In the course of my job I often had to call for an ambulance. And no matter how many times I did call, adrenal was rushing through my body each time.

Here are some hints: when you call, you are speaking to the 911 call center. They have a set of questions to ask and do not want you to be "helpful" by volunteering any info.

Let them ask you the questions they need answered. They will, of course, ask for your address. I learned this the hard way when we opened in a new building.

No, they can't locate you by phone! So if you are visiting someone, KNOW the address before calling.

They also go through some medical history of the down person. I often had nothing I could contribute since I usually didn't know the person but if you know anything about the person, give them that info.

Go and open the door (if you are able to leave the person). They want someone at the door to direct. I was really disciplined by the EMT when they arrived and they were not directed to the down person. I usually found the experience quite intense and rather non-friendly.

They told me once when I called non-emergency to ask about the process, they have a protocol they must follow and while they are speaking to us, they are notifying the appropriate agency to send. I tried to remember it was more important the down person was helped, than the operator was helpful and chatty!

Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service are perennially popular poses, as are phony Amazon calls. They might claim you've won a lottery, or tell you to press a particular key to learn more or get off a call list.
