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Esther Barbour continued...As you know, she had congestive heart failure and had been in hospice at home since January of this year. Hospice of Santa Cruz County was wonderful!... The nurses and aides came to her and made sure she was comfortable.

Through March, mom was able to enjoy life, going to movies and coffees with her Village Santa Cruz friends, hanging out with the grandkids, eating whatever the heck she wanted!

Then stupid Covid caused us to completely shelter in place, and social and medical visits switched to Zoom. But she was still engaged and happy, and just taking one day at time, like all of us now.

From Mary Howe:

'I remember the first time Esther and Allison came to our Westside Coffee. Esther, pointed her thumb towards Allison and said, in her deadpan voice, something to the effect, 'She's making me come because I just stopped driving and she wants me to get out more.'

By the time that Coffee Hour was over, Esther was a solid part of our Circle.

She wasn't a huge talker but when Esther spoke, people listened. She was, as she called herself, a political junkie, and I knew I could get the latest on any national issue or figure, from Esther. I missed her input to our recent discussions on Voting.

Esther helped start and lead our painting group; turns out she was quite an artist. A few times, she cajoled her son, an art teacher in the Bay Area, to come down and give our group a lesson. Esther's mother was from Puerto Rico and her father from the Philippines. She talked a bit about the racism she felt at times during her life. But when she recounted incidences of racism her children encountered growing up, her eyes hardened and her voice took on a tone that made me know I wouldn't want to be on the wrong side of this woman.

In this last year (before COVID stopped in-person meetings) when Esther was more home-bound due to her health, she welcomed a small group of us for lunch & scrabble at her house. I discovered another Esther talent; she's quite a good scrabble player.







I miss Esther, as I know many of our group does. Because of our demographic, the passing of members is bound to happen. Knowing that doesn't make the missing and sadness any less. We love you, Esther!

Some may not fear a fall at all but live in an environment or lifestyle full of risks while others may be completely afraid of falling. Discussing this allows participants to think about steps they can take in their home or health to prevent falls.

Participants will be asked to keep a falls journal, with short entries each day of any fall or loss of balance details as well as fall prevention ideas. There will be short check in phone calls each week following the interview and one final wrap up interview.

Cabrillo Music Festival 2020 presents: Celebrating Woman Suffrage + the Struggle for Voting Rights: A Panel Discussion Sun, Aug 9, 11 AM

As we approach the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment and stand at the threshold of a presidential election, "Celebrating Woman Suffrage + the Struggle for Voting Rights" is a panel discussion examining the complex history of enfranchisement in the United States and its relevance to the issues of equal rights today.

A dynamic group of speakers includes Gail Pellerin, Santa Cruz County Clerk/Registrar of Voters, as our moderator; with presentations by Judge Marla Anderson, Judge of the Superior Court of California, Monterey County; Bettina Aptheker, scholar-activist and Distinguished Professor Emerita of the Feminist Studies Department at University California Santa Cruz; and Professor Aida Hurtado, Chair of UCSB Department of Chicana and Chicano Studies. The event will be followed by a live Q&A, and precedes an evening concert featuring the orchestral world premiere of The Battle for the Ballot by composer Stacy Garrop, inspired by the centenary of the 19th amendment and pivotal figures in the Woman Suffrage movement.

A FREE program for all seniors - Senior Center Without Limits. This innovative virtual program is open to all people over age 60 in Santa Cruz County. Seniors, many of whom have been sheltering at home for months, now have online opportunities for activities to help them stay physically, socially, creatively, and cognitively engaged. In the first two weeks of the program, 190 seniors have participated in classes! Classes include: exercise, technology help, art, and more! Voting 101:

Register to Vote: If you have not yet registered to vote you can do so here:

Vote by Mail: On May 8, 2020 Governor Gavin Newsom issued Executive Order N-64-20, which, among other things, orders that a vote-by-mail ballot be mailed to each voter prior to November 3, 2020 in addition to offering in-person voting locations.

Voter Education and Outreach: Want to spread the word about voting? Visit <u>Voter Education and</u> <u>Outreach</u> to find out how you can join CA State Secretary Padilla and a wide range of employers, nonprofit organizations and educators around the state who are working to improve voter participation in California.

Snail Mail Moving Ever More Snail-Like: The US Postal Service is undergoing changes that will most likely result in slower mail service. Because of this USPS is recommending Voters get their ballots in the mail at least one week before elections.

Also, their recommendations on the length of time it may take to recieve a requested ballot, means that for Californians, if you are not yet registered to vote & plan to mail in your ballot, please register at least two weeks before election time. (Remember - all registered California Voters will be receiving a ballot by mail).
